In addition to our regular Thursday night meeting, we have less formal social meetings of the club. The **Monthly Friday Lunch** is now open to members, honorary members and partners. Trish Yates sources interesting places to eat where the meal and glass of wine is available at a reasonable cost.

We also have a weekly **Happy Hour** at Onyx, 13/328 Reserve Road Cheltenham. There is a regular group of 10-12 people who meet for drinks between 4-6pm on Fridays and topics are wide ranging. Last Friday the topic was:

"How many members of RCOB were born in the UK?"

We had a fascinating talk by the Monash university medical students of TeamMed Nepal on Thursday night. Established in 2009 TeamMed works with the Himalayan Guge Organisation to deliver healthcare to remote areas of Bhakanje, Nepal. They run health camps and have established a permanent health clinic in Bigu Gompa. Our funds have been used productively and it was inspiring to hear Rachel Chen talk of her commitment to Global Health.

This week's speaker is Sandra Cavallo from Matt's Place, a charity we have been supporting over many years. We will hear about current projects and the increasing need in our community to help those who are skipping meals due to financial hardship, and those who are homeless. In the Chair is Soula Deville who is a volunteer at Matt's Place and our representative. Please come along to support this essential service.

Fact-Finding Trip to Sabu and Kupang

Members Mark, Max and Geoff recently returned from a fact-finding trip to Sabu and Kupang, to look at how our contributions have been used, what condition things were in, and what is still needed. Accompanying them were friends of Rotary Greg Davis, Hayden Stockdale and Chris s'Ferrazza.

IN Sabu we met with Pastor Franz and current students at the hostels and distributed small gifts. We also met with former students Maria N (a nurse-midwife) and Tesa (a teacher) who you will remember from the Sabu update on our website.

We journeyed from Seba over rough roads to visit several schools in the rural south of Sabu, where we had helped in the past. On the way, it was hard to miss the rice crops sitting in parched fields – the result of another half-hearted monsoon.

At Mahona Elementary School where we replaced the cyclone-damaged water tank last year, it was great to see the new one installed and connected to the nearby well. And we were able to meet with two of the teachers there, and noted what other things needed attention.

At another location we were shown two more damaged tanks, one of which had been moved several metres by the cyclonic winds and was shattered at the top and badly cracked near the base.

On our return to Kupang we visited all three tertiary student hostels: Air-mata hostel (15 boys) Walikota (29 girls) and Penfui (56 girls) where we inspected the new upper storey. We took extensive notes of remaining student furniture and equipment needs at all three and flagged some maintenance issues. We also met with several members of the Yayasan (Foundation) team.

As the end of the Rotary year approached, great detective work by Richard Potter established that some District Grant funds were still available.

From our notes we were able to select the priority needs to compile a "shopping list" of furniture and equipment for the students in Kupang: a number of additional bunk beds, mattresses and wardrobes, individual study desks at Penfui girls hostel, larger group study tables and a water-tank and Wi-Fi-printer at Wali-kota girls hostel. This list accompanied a district grant application for \$2,500 submitted a few days after the team returned to Australia which was approved on 23rd June. AUD\$5,000 was send to Sabu on 29th June.

Royal Flying Doctor Vic update.




You may recall that my "partners project" for 2022 – 2023 was collecting for the Royal Flying Doctor Service Vic (RFDS).


With the help of members and friends we managed to reach my target of \$6,000. The funds were paid to RFDS on 20th June. Here is a certificate from RFDS.

Speakers: Rachel Chen

Topic: Update on TeamMED Activities

Rachel Chen, a fourth-year medical student from Monash University gave an update on TeamMED activities supporting health needs in Nepal. She was an excellent speaker and answered all questions with great authority and depth. The following is an outline of her talk.

About TeamMED Nepal

Est. 2009

Monash University student-led organization that seeks to contribute to global health and address regional healthcare needs.

Well established projects in Nepal, Tonga, Uganda, India, and Philippines

Work in partnership with Himalayan Guge Organisation (HGO) to deliver healthcare to remote communities in Nepal (Bhakanje)

Not-for-profit NGO

"Promote health-related educational, cultural and community interventions in the Himalayan region of Nepal".

Run annual health camps in remote communities.

Established permanent health clinic in Bigu Gompa (entirely self-sufficient as of 2018!)

Our partner community - Bhakanje. A part of the Solukhumbu District (northern part has Mt Everest)

10hr bus trip + 4-day hike from Kathmandu. Heights of up to 4000m

No healthcare facility and too far to go to Kathmandu.

What The Team Has Achieved So Far

Pre-2020

5-day health camps in Bigu, Dolakhu, Soloban and Solokumbha

2020

- Raised over \$6000.
- Purchased obstetric equipment and medications that were transported to Bhakanje.

2021

- Fundraised \$8211
- \$3200 went towards equipment for Bhakanje.
- \$2000 to India-Nepal covid relief fund
- \$3000 to HGO education scholarships

2022 Achievements

Raised \$4027 funds to support free health camp at



Dolangsa.

- Reason: Remote location = lack of healthcare access
- Provided free medical consultations, therapies, moxibustion, cupping therapy, injections and sorig herbal medications.
- Attended by 247 patients from 4yo to 100yo.

Our Plans for This Year and Beyond

Goal: Replicate the success in Bigu and establish a local, self-sufficient health post and birthing centre in Bhakanje Spreading awareness of the healthcare needs in the community

Fundraise to purchase medical supplies and equipment. December 2023 (2 weeks)

Purchase medical supplies with funds raised in Kathmandu.

Bus ride + 4-day hike to Bhakanje with medical supplies 5-day health camp (under the supervision of Nepalese doctors and nurses)

Supplying community with medical supplies (e.g., birthing kits, stethoscopes, first aid kits)

What your donations will go towards

Medications e.g., antibiotics, pain medications (given to patients free of charge)

Medical supplies (BP cuffs, thermometers, birthing kits) to leave with community.

Sponsoring local Nepalese doctor and nurses

Fund trekking guides + sherpas to help transport supplies.

Future operation of permanent local clinic in Bhakanje

Students self-fund all expenses and all donations will go towards addressing the needs of the community.

Speakers Reports

Speaker: Cameron Dare Topic: Team Sports 4 All Update

Cameron gave his usual enthusiastic and informative talk on the latest situation regarding TS4All. Notes from his presentation are covered below.



Recap

We believe in the power of sport & sporting clubs to transform the lives of kids.

- WHO Assist kids from the most financially disadvantaged households.
 - ⇒ Also, the most socially isolated kids in our community poorer health, education, etc.
- WHAT Fund them to play sport any sport, any club
 - ⇒ Pay for registration, as well as provide uniforms, footwear, equipment, etc.
 - ⇒ Support them on an ongoing basis through our volunteer team.

WHY – Sporting clubs are a Good Gang that they can thrive in.

What We've Been Up to

- Launched TS4A in the Western Suburbs (Q2 2023) Wyndham, Werribee
 - ⇒ ABS data = 7,943 kids live in welfare dependent housing (vs Bayside = 575)
 - ⇒ Secured financial backing through Hopper Motor Group

- ⇒ Recruited and trained a Regional Coordinator and core group of volunteers.
- ⇒ First kids commence playing sport.
- Launched and delivered TS4A Challenge Event 2023
 - ⇒ Participation numbers grew from 450 in 2022 to 1,079 in 2023.
 - ⇒ 13 event sponsors (up from 7 in 2023) including Rotary Hampton & Rotary Peninsula
 - \Rightarrow \$75,601 raised up from \$44,000 in 2022.
- Secured office space (\$0 rent) for our team to work together from in Cheltenham.
 - ⇒ Seen referrals per month grow to a new recent all-time high of 35 (Cost of Living)
 - ⇒ Seen kid numbers grow by 30% to 325 (85 in Bayside LGA)
- Welcomed the support of 39 new financial supporters:
 - ⇒ The Phillips Foundation
 - ⇒ The Dyson Foundation
 - ⇒ The Bagot Gjergja Foundation
 - ⇒ Bluff Road Medical Centre

Next 6 Months...

- Consolidate Western Suburbs launch and establish a strong base there.
- Commence TS4A operations in 3x new regions:
 - ⇒ City of Greater Dandenong (ABS data = 4,049 kids)
 - ⇒ Manningham & Whitehorse (ABS data = (1,078 & 1,378 kids)
- Hire two key resources required for further scale:
 - ⇒ Chief Executive Officer
 - ⇒ Fundraising Event Manager (part-time)
- More kids playing sport...500+ by the end of 2023!!!
