The Warracknabeal Visit

Twenty-three members of Beaumaris Rotary enjoyed an official trip to Warracknabeal on August 18-20th. The trip was initiated by Clem Quick who has very strong connections with the Rotary Club of Warracknabeal established in 1934, 90 years ago next year. Clem started attending meetings there in 1968 and was President in 1979. We enjoyed dinner on Friday night at the Palace Hotel and



listened to Clem tell us about the Dingo proof fence that ran from the South Australian border through to Swan Hill PHOTO. The purpose was to keep the dingos from killing the sheep. In 1906-1931 a channel system was created over 16,000 km to enable water to flow and for homesteads to be operational. That system is still in place.



On Saturday we were treated to a visit to the painted silos. Those at Sheep Hills were breathtaking in the intensity of the colour and the expertise of the artist who drew them. Further silos were painted at Brim, Clem's hometown. We also saw the Stick Shed at Murtoa, constructed from tree trunks in order to store 3 million bushels of wheat during the war. Our wheat could not be transported due to the supply ships being attacked at sea, and the Stick Shed was constructed over 3 months to store the wheat safely. Photo right.

We thoroughly enjoyed a Vocational Visit to Rotarian Pe-



ter Martin's farm. Peter explained the technology that now drives successful farming. Only big farms survive these days, and his farm is 2 thousand hectares / 5 thousand acres. The machinery is huge, and the header and the air seeder are around a million dollars each. Photos next page. These days there is no need to leave a field fallow, as the seeder can insert rows between the crop from last year.







Morning tea was held at the Brim Sports Centre where we were looked after by the Brim Country Club. RCOB members tried their best at putting on sand scrapes.



Another stand-out experience however was the Warracknabeal Races. Unbeknown to us Gail Anderson had organised that race #4 would be designated "Beaumaris Rotary Supporting Country Victoria." We were thanked in the official Race Booklet, Photos right . and cheered at the Finishing Line, (Photo next page).

Our Fellowship night with the Rotary Club of Warracknabeal was held at the Creekside Hotel. David Greenhall recalled some key events from his time with Warracknabeal and then members of the club outlined their three key projects:

The Primary School Breakfast, that is held on a

Tuesday provides 70-80 sandwiches and juice for the school children. It's known as Happy Tuesday! Teachers comment that the children are better able to concentrate on Tuesdays due to this program.

- Curry Night. An enterprise with a local restauranteur, the Curry Night is open to the public and is capped at 100 people. The restauranteur also conducts master classes in cooking curry that is also open to the public.
- The most ambitious program however is their Sheep Program. It began by encouraging Rotarians to purchase fully grown lambs to be fattened up. The lambs were split amongst the farms to be raised they took about 12 each. The next phase was to purchase 50 cross-bred Merino ewes and a couple of rams and a breeding program was underway. They sold lambs and raised \$10,000 in the first year, plus \$1500 from selling the wool.

President John Tonkin gave a Warracknabeal banner to President Denise and fellowship continued into the night. (Photo next page). It was a wonderful weekend, and it whetted our enthusiasm for more Vocational Visits. We may go back for their 90th birthday next year.

Many thanks to Clem Quick for his initiative in organising the visit with Warracknabeal Rotary, and to Gail Anderson for somehow getting Beaumaris Rotary named for an event. She also gave each of us a gift mascot of a horse to remember the event. Thank you both.






You will then see the ClubRunner dialog box. Click on New User.

Dear Rotary or Rotaract member,

Thank you to the over 200 people who attended our July webinars to hear the latest updates on the Regionalisation Pilot. You can view a recording of one of the webinars here.

Rotary and Rotaract clubs and members are at the heart of the Regionalisation Pilot. You are the ones who make a difference in your communities everyday and attract people to Rotary and Rotaract. The Pilot's main goal is to find ways to more effectively and efficiently support you and your club to increase impact, grow membership, and adapt to changing volunteer needs and expectations.

We encourage you to actively discuss this opportunity in your club. In this update there are two key changes where you and your club have the opportunity to have an active voice.

Regional Council Election

Governance across the zone will be overseen by a <u>Regional Council</u> elected by clubs. The Regional Council will be led by a Chair who will be supported by a Chair-Elect, with each serving two-year terms.

As Rotarians and Rotaractors of Rotary Districts participating in the Regionalisation Pilot, you will soon be able to apply for the Regional Council positions of Chair, Chair-Elect and Portfolio Leads. Only Rotaractors can apply to be the Rotaract Nominee. The role descriptions for these positions are now available on the Creating Tomorrow website.

You will receive further emails in the coming weeks about the election process and how to apply for Regional Council roles.

Once all nominations are received, we will be coming back to Club Presidents who will vote on behalf of their club to elect Regional Council positions, with the election expected to take place in October this year. This will be a critical opportunity for clubs to choose who will lead our region.

Community Groups

From 1 July 2024 the proposed regional model includes a new way of grouping clubs, with each group of clubs referred to as a 'Rotary Community Group'. . . . By working together, clubs can support each other to increase their impact, amplify Rotary's public image, and strengthen member engagement.

Club Presidents and Secretaries will soon receive information to start club conversations about how you would like to be grouped with other clubs.

Once clubs select their Community Groups, we will then be ready to start the process of nominations and elections for Rotary Community Leaders (RCLs) to mentor and support them. If you have questions about this or want to find out more, then why not join us later this month for our next round of webinars.




